By the time this newsletter has been sent, your Executive Committee will have already had its first meeting of the new membership year 2014-2015. We are setting a very active agenda this year, including completing the submission of the 501(c)3 application, organizing key Granite Lake Association documents into binders for all members of the Executive Committee, and discussing ways the Granite Lake Association can become as active in the reduction of phosphorus and siltation issues as we have mobilized to guard against invasive plants. I'd like to see our Association launch an effort that could have the same success and profile in these new areas as we have experienced with the Lake Host program.

We are also looking to reinvigorate our web site, and we will have discussed various options at our meeting, September 3rd. We can inform the membership now that <u>www.granitelakenh.org</u> has been secured as a domain! Not that much of a change for the membership from the previous name. The goal is for the key documents to be on the web site for the entire membership to see at any time like the ByLaws, as well as minutes of our meetings, the newsletter, and any other items relevant to members.

We hope that when we get together next year on Saturday morning the 18th of July 2015 at 9:30am, we will have a lively meeting to discuss our progress. With the active agenda that we're contemplating, more involvement from the members will likely be needed so as not to wear out the enthusiasm of the few by securing the participation of the many! It was sad to see Labor Day come - it was such a beautiful midsummer like day, but remember the lake lowering will begin shortly in mid-September, and docks should be removed completely from waters of Granite Lake before the snow and ice season commences.

Cyanobacteria Pilot Project Tom Newcombe

EPA New England has initiated a project to estimate cyanobacteria concentrations in our region's lakes. Cyanobacteria produce a specific pigment called phycocyanin.

The goal of the project is to measure phycocyanin levels in lake water using a process called flourometry, and correlate the observed levels with the occurrence of cyanobacteria blooms. Over time, protocols will be established to predict the risk of cyanobacteria blooms based on trends in the relative abundance of phycocyanin. These trends could be useful in measuring the benefits of watershed management projects which reduce siltation, since the phosphorus contained in silt is the primary nutrient which feeds cyanobacteria growth in lake water. EPA is providing states in the region with all the tools necessary to collect and analyze the samples, and requesting assistance from volunteer organizations to collect the samples. In New Hampshire, this effort is being led by the DES Volunteer Lake Assessment Program, or VLAP - which Granite Lake has participated in since 1988. Initially, one extra sample of lake water will be collected at the deep spot when regular VLAP samples are collected. Analysis will be done at the DES lab in Concord. I have obtained a kit with instructions from DES, and will be collecting our first phycocyanin sample during this summer's final sampling in early September.

SUCCESSFUL BLS/AED COURSE Bob Englund

On the evening of August 11th, 15 members of the Granite Lake community participated in a Red-Cross sponsored course which reviewed the principles of Basic Life Support including the use of the Artificial External Defibrillator. Those participating included Tom and Judy Walton, Chris Dobriansky, Dave and Cayla Pagniucci, Nick and Angel Nicoletti, Dave and Claire Costin, Tammy McKane, Lucy Ryder, Harry and Anita Flanagan, Kathy Allen, and Bob Englund.

Because they do not function when the temperature is below 45 degrees, the "seasonal" defibrillators of Nick Nicoletti and Bob Englund will be inside their houses as of mid-October; those units are available in the cold months only when they are at home. Similarly, the summertime defibrillator of Tom and Birgitte Hastings is unavailable after mid-September. The AED located in the kitchen cabinet of the Chapel-by-the-Lake is available 24/7/365, and the door to the church is never locked.

BLS/AED courses are given in most communities, and they are conducted by various organizations including the Red Cross, American Heart Association, the YMCA, Fire Departments and other organizations. Being able to perform basic cardio-pulmonary resuscitation and to use an Automatic External Defibrillator can save lives in the event of a cardiac arrest. It is best to be prepared!

65 ANNUAL MEETING Sunday, July 20, 2014 Chapel by the Lake - 11:00 AM Munsonville, New Hampshire Minutes

The 65th Annual meeting was called to order at 11:08, July 20, 2014 by President Lynn Angle. She led the pledge of allegiance, introduced the officers, and asked for a motion to approve the minutes of the 2013 Annual Meeting as they appeared in the May newsletter. The motion was accepted.

Tom Newcombe summarized the treasurer's report. The ending cash balance was \$6920.71 before expenses; \$4075.71 after. Lake Host program \$4635.77; watershed account, \$1624.22. The Executive Board proposed dissolving the cell tower account

and merging it into the general fund. AT&T has no plans to locate tower on Melville Hill - though the court case resolution would allow AT&T to reapply. The board proposed leaving the Lake Host fund as is. Future donations should be put into the water quality projects account. The motion was made, seconded and accepted.

Bob Englund spoke about the four AED units around the lake. There are AED's in the garden shed at Englund's, one at Nicoletti's front door, one at Chapel -by -the -Lake inside in the first cupboard in the kitchen, and a seasonal one at the Hasting's dock. As the AED units need to be kept at temperatures above 40 F, the only one available in the winter is the one in the Chapel.

A motion was made that GLA help fund the training in CPR and AED use on AUG. 11 at 6:30 at the Chapel. Participants need to send \$25.00 to Bob Englund by Aug. 1. There is a 15-person limit. Please sign up. The motion was made and accepted to fund this project with \$1000.

Bob Mitchell (chairman of water quality committee) said the number one problem at Granite Lake is siltation. Extreme rainfalls cause silt and salt to come into GL more than ever. Stoddard voted last year to put in \$25,000 over 2 years to fix the culvert problem at W.Shore/ N.Shore Rd. An engineering study paid for by the GLA showed ways of fixing it (albeit with their price of \$40+K). Phil Hamilton and Bob Mitchell met the road agent last week to discuss action. Once they get the permit, they should get the work done in the time allowed.

They discussed the erosion from logging at Nye Meadow (loggers were required to return, put out hay bales, and plant grass) and Little Granite Lake (road is up a steep and rocky hillside). The State forester will be coming; possibly taking issue to the press.*

A 150-foot wake speed limit from shore was suggested during and after heavy rain to mitigate erosion on the shoreline. GLA will post a sign at the ramp when necessary. One may call the Marine Patrol at any time one sees flagrant violations however the Marine patrol spend most of their time at the big lakes at and around Winnepesauke. Phil said that the salt spilled at the DOT on Route 9 is much less now than before. Bob's report was accepted

VLAP report from last winter showed no unusual results; however the clarity of the lake has gone from an astonishingly good high --11 meters-- to about 7-8 meters in the past 3 years -- mostly due to extreme rains. Phosphorous in silt and fertilizer lead to algae bloom which become much worse when the weather gets hot. Lake Host: Anita thanked all the volunteers and contributors to the LH program. So far hosts have recorded 285 boats at the ramp, not counting when no one is on duty or boats launched at other sites at the lake. Statewide there have been 32 saves, 9 in uninfested lakes. Boats here have been very clean. Coverage is full on Tuesday and Thursday but positions are open for Monday, Wednesday, and Friday afternoons. Discussion followed whether we should have paid coverage Friday afternoon. It was suggested that a tally be taken on how many boats put in then. We are on target with contributions and grant money. Anita's report was accepted.

Weed watching: Bill Steiniger said members were "out day and night" looking for weeds and no exotic milfoil has been located. He encouraged anyone with a sample to bring it to him and, if it is questionable, he will dispatch it to Concord overnight. Anyone interested in joining this effort is welcome. Robin and Bill will be glad to introduce you to the weed information.

Loons: 2 chicks were born mid-June; one later suffered injuries due to a rogue loon coming onto the lake and attacking the group. The mother shoved the chick onto shore for safety but the chick was found dead near Levigne's beach the next day.

501(c)3 Bob Mitchell reported that the Executive Committee we has been pursuing federal nonprofit status for tax-exempt contribution and grants requests. The GLA had to adopt a conflict of interest clause - all the board members have signed -- and they had to adopt a dissolution clause --what we would do with the money if the GLA dissolved. The Executive Committee chose to have it go to the NEW HAMP-SHIRE LAKES ASSOCIATION as any monies had to go to another non-profit 501-(c)3 organization. The motion was made and seconded to accept the proposal for 501(c)3 application. Motion passed.

David Pagniucci spoke about raising the GLA dues to \$35. /single, \$50.00/couple in light of a need to have a little more financial security for the organization. Many people weighed in on how to assess whether it should be per household or by person. Finally agreed to leave it as 1 vote for single membership and 2 votes for a family (objecting that a couple may want to vote against each other. Dita added that when the By Laws were being revised in 2006, the consensus was against one vote per couple). We may have to use colored cards in case of a close vote in the future. A motion was made and seconded to raise membership dues to \$35/individual and \$50/family. Motion was accepted. Last year an aggressive and very effective membership campaign was conducted house to house. It was suggested that all the current members talk up the GLA with any non-member neighbors or whoever is new to the lake. Unlike the Granite Lake Village District, one does not need to own land here to be a member of the GLA. Newsletters go to many in the Granite Lake watershed.

Thanks to Betty Ripley who has been sending word along of ownership changes for years. Thank you all who put in your articles for the newsletter. As no by-law changes are upcoming, Dita will try to send the next newsletter by e-mail to those who checked 'yes."

Finally, Dita asked if anyone would like to replace her as membership chair or news editor Suggestions: list the names all paid members in the newsletter; another to put in names of new people in town. Dita's report was accepted

A motion was made and seconded to donate \$350.00 to the Chapel-by-the Lake. Motion was accepted.

Phil Hamilton nominated the slate of officers: President, David Pagniucci, 2 year term; Vice-president, Harry Flanagan, 2-year; Treasurer, Tom Newcombe, 2 year term; Secretary, Sally Ripley, 2 year term; Officer-at-large, Bill Steiniger, 2 year term. A motion was made and seconded to approve the nominations as presented. All in favor. Executive Board Committees: Water Quality chairman

- Bob Mitchell; Lake Host point person - Anita Flanagan; Membership – Dita Englund; nominating committee chair - Phil Hamilton. Accepted as read

The Annual Granite Lake community potluck picnic will be held on August 17 at 3 pm at Sandy Beach. Bring your own chair, drink and dish to share. Nelson Band will play at the picnic first, and, weather permitting, will tour the lake playing as they go.

Bob Kingsbury contributed to the Nelson Town Band.

The domain name for our web site has expired and was taken by another organization. We are trying to acquire a new domain name and get a web site set up again as the board believes we could do a lot better job of communication.

The Executive board suggested that since the new pastor at the Chapel is conducting a service at 11:00 on Sundays, the GLA annual meeting should be changed to **Saturday morning**, July 18, 2015 at 9:30 **a.m.** The motion was made and accepted The porta-potty for the public ramp is just behind the fire station.

The issue of parking around the lake has come up due to heavy traffic, mostly on weekends. Please be sure that emergency vehicles have room to get by. Lynn warned that cars must of off the pavement along Granite Lake Rd.

The commissioners of the Granite Lake Village District will begin drawing the water down about Sept. 20 per the order of the State Fish & Game (lake trout nesting).

Diane Halter thanked everyone for the help that the community gives to the Chapel.

The GLA's quest for 501 (c) 3 IRS tax-exempt status is progressing according to plan. The Executive Committee has adopted the mandatory Conflict of Interest Policy and at the annual meeting on July 20, 2014 the Association's members voted to proceed with the 501 (C) 3 application and to amended the Association's bylaws to include a mandatory dissolution article. The narrative and Q&A portions of the application are 90 percent complete. The financial history and current status remain to be established per IRS requirements. We expect that your annual dues and any additional contributions to the Association will be tax-exempt by next year.

Granite Lake Association REMINDERS

1. Boat traffic around the lake, and specifically around the island, should be counter clockwise.

2. Safety rules: (taken from the NH Boating Regulations)

**Boats must keep 150 feet from other boats, swimmers, floats, docks, marked swimming areas, and the shore itself, when traveling above headway speed.

**Boats must adhere to headway speed in the cove. PWCs must be at least 150 feet from shore when traveling above headway speed

**All boats - power, sail, canoes, kayaks, wind surfers - must have one Coast Guard approved flotation device for each person aboard. Ski belts are not acceptable.

**Children age 5 and under MUST WEAR an approved jacket or vest.

**In NH, boats under 16 feet in length must carry an oar or paddle

**The driver of any motorboat with an engine of greater than 25 HP must be 16 years or older unless accompanied by an adult. All drivers must have a license.

** Single or dual passenger ski craft with capacity of over 20mph and carrying 1 or 2 people are not allowed by law on Granite Lake

**For water skiing, two people in the boat are mandatory: the driver and the observer (13 or older). Additional observers are required for additional skiers.

**All boats operating after sunset and before sunrise must display proper lights.

**Questions and complaints should be directed to the Marine Patrol (603-293-2037)

3. Inspect boats and trailers coming from other lakes to insure they are free of all traces of aquatic life to prevent the introduction of hazardous forms (e.g. Exotic Milfoil or Zebra mussels) to Granite Lake. Inspect the boat; flush the cooling system, bilge areas, and wells with tap water. Discard all bait that may have contacted infested waters.

**Let your boat dry for 48 hours. If extensively fouled by algae, wash the boat with hot water (140 F) which kills Zebra Mussels. High pressure will also remove them.

**Avoid driving through vegetation to prevent the spread of Milfoil. Disposal of vegetation should occur well away from water sources.

4. Fishermen are asked to discontinue use of lead sinkers -- stainless steel replacements are available.

5 Fertilizer, except for limestone, is not to be used within 25 feet of the water's edge. Phosphorus-free fertilizer, IRONITE, is approved for lakeside use by the Dept. of Environmental Services.

6. Lake residents should be sure their guests are informed of, and observe, all applicable rules and follow appropriate behavior.

7. Boat operators are urged to operate their boats in a safe, legal and considerate manner, knowing that excessive noise can be disturbing to their neighbors on the lake and damaging to wildlife.

8. Use environmentally friendly products. Never use soap in the lake.

9. Do not feed any wild water fowl on the lake. In order to protect the lakes, ponds and surrounding watershed, both Nelson and Stoddard have regulations against intentionally feeding wild waterfowl. Individuals violating the regulation may be subject to a fine of not more than \$50. The birds may look nice, but they are a major source of pollution.

10. Please keep the Island safe and attractive by avoiding unsafe conditions, such as those caused by broken glass or any other debris, and by removing your rubbish when leaving the island. It is a natural preserve owned by Granite Lake Assoc. However, for insurance and legal reasons, GLA does not provide any trash removal service.

11. No overnight camping, camp fires, or fireworks are allowed on the Island.

12. Do not hesitate to call the NH Marine Patrol if you see flagrant abuses of these rules or dangerous behavior. Their number is 877-642-9700. For Boater Education courses call 888-252-2125.
